Valerie Russell is President of the City Mission Society of Boston (CMS). She is the first woman and the first layperson to head the society. Founded in 1816, CMS is the second oldest voluntary social service agency in the United States. An Urban Affairs specialist with particular interest in the application of religion to social issues, Ms. Russell has lectured on theology at the Union Theological Seminary, Yale Divinity School and Harvard Divinity School. She served as Assistant to the President of the United Church of Christ and headed two major programs related to urban ministry at the Riverside Church in New York City. Ms. Russell is also a corporation member of the United Way of Massachusetts Bay and Minister of Metro Mission in Boston.

Judith Plaskow, 1989 Keynote Speaker

Conference Theme: Body and Spirituality



Judith Plaskow is Associate Professor of Religious Studies at Manhattan College and a writer and speaker on topics related to feminist theology. Her Ph.D. was from Yale University in 1975 with a dissertation topic of "Sex, Sin, and Grace: Women's Experience and the Theologies of Reinhold Niebuhr and Paul Tillich."

Judith was co-founder in 1983 of The Journal of Feminist Studies in Religion, and continues to serve as its co-editor. She served as secretary on the Executive Committee of The American Acade-

my of Religion from 1980 to 1984, and was on the AAR program committee from 1974-1977. She was co-chair of the Women and Religion Group from 1972-1974, and has been on the steering committee since it became the Women and Religion Section of the AAR. She is also a member of the Women's Caucus - Religious Studies, the National Women's Studies Association and the New York Feminist Scholars in Religion. Since 1980, except for one year, she has served on the Advisory Board at Harvard Divinity School of the Women's Studies in Religion Program. She is associate editor of Anima and is on the editorial board of Tikkun. Judith has many published articles and conference presentations on Jewish feminism, anti-Semitism, religious language and roles, and body and spirituality.

1990 Keynote Speaker

Carter Heyward of Episcopal Divinity School has consented to be our 1990 keynoter. Carter has published a book detailing the journey to her "irregular" ordination to the Episcopal priesthood. She has other books and works on many social justice issues including sexism, heterosexism, nationalism, hunger and poverty. The conference theme has not yet been chosen.

The Women and Spirituality Logo

The Orant, the woman with arms outstretched in celebration, is an ancient image of prayer and blessings. Her roots are Jewish; she appears in medieval statues, paintings of Mary and pilgrims at the wailing wall in Jerusalem today. She frequently decorated the frescoed walls of the catacombs which Christians used as meeting and hiding places.

While she has a very specific heritage in Judaic-Christian tradition, searching out her meaning can help us touch both our commonalities and our differences as women seeking fullness and inclusivity in our spirituality.

Given next year's keynoter, Judith Plaskow, we hope to focus some dialogue on the Jewish roots of Christianity. Probing our reactions to the Orant, the image that has represented this conference since its beginning, can help us begin this potentially healing dialogue. Therefore, the Planning Committee for the Women and Spirituality Conference, with the help of Lillian Sprintz, has done some re-evaluting and re-looking at what the symbol has meant within the context of our efforts to create a nurturing setting for a dialogue of caring and mutual respect between and among different spiritual traditions. We want a symbol that reflects the inclusivity and multiplicity of the diverse women who attend this conference. We invite you to share your insights and reactions to the image of the Orant both in the evaluation form and at the closing feedback session where we will ask for some discussion of this issue.






