1990 Keynote Speaker

Carter Heywood is a Professor of Theology at the Episcopal Divinity School in Cambridge, Massachusetts. She was ordained an Episcopal priest in 1974. Her primary areas of teaching include Anglican Theology, Systemic Theology, Feminist Liberation Theology, Liberation Theologies — especially Latin America, Theology of Sexuality, and Theological Method. Carter's current research interests focus on Christology and healing and liberation with special attention to addiction and recovery in women's lives and the dynamics of a healing relationship. Carter has many book and essay publications on Christian Theology. Her most recent books are Touching Our Strength: The Erotic as Power and the Hope of God, and Speaking of Christ: A Lesbian Feminist Voice. Carter has been a contributing editor to The Witness since 1984 and has also been on the editorial board of the Journal of Feminist Studies in Religion since 1984.




