Kate Rushin

The Fourteenth Annual Women and Spirituality Conference will be held at Mankato State University on Saturday & Sunday, October 14 & 15, 1995. This year our Keynote Speaker is Kate Rushin. She is an African American poet and teacher. Her first book of poem, The Black Back-Ups, published in 1993 was chosen by the New York Public Library as a "Books for the Teen Age 1994" selection and was nominated for a Lambda Book Award. She is a recipient of

the Massachusetts Artists' Foundation Fellowship, the 1988 Grolier Poetry Prize and an Honorable Mention in the 1994 Galway Kinnell Poetry Contest. Rushin is a former fellow of the Fine Arts Work Center in Provincetown and has attended Cummington Community of the Arts and the Breadloaf Writers' Conference. She collaborated with The Underground Railway Theater on the play "Sanctuary: The Spirit of Harriet Tubman." Her poems have appeared in

The Black Woman's Health Book, Double Stitch, This Bridge Called My Back: Writings By Radical Women of Color, Home Girls: A Black Feminist Anthology, An Ear to The Ground: An Anthology of Contemporary American Poetry, New Worlds of Literature, "Ms. Magazine," The English Teaching Forum and "Callaloo." Rushin worked as a Massachusetts Artist-In-Residence in high schools and elementary schools for seven years. From 1982-1992, she was a member of the New Words Book Store Collective in Cambridge, MA, and has taught courses on writing and Black Women Writers at Brown University, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Boston University, Curry College, UMASS Harbor Campus and South Boston High School and the Jefferson Park Writing Center. She received her B.A. from Oberlin College and her Master of Fine Arts in Creative Writing from Brown University. Currently, she is Director of The Center for African American Studies and Visiting Writer at Wesleyan University.

HONORING THE SACRED: BIRTHING IN THE WISE WOMAN TRADITION CSU 253

Discussion/Ritual/Experiential

We will discuss some of the historical differences between the traditional midwifery approach to birth at home, and the medical model of birth in the hospital. We will focus on how traditional midwives work in contemporary society; continuing to honor women's safe rite of passage into motherhood. We will explore spiritual empowerment, responsibility, safety, wholistic prenatal care and preparing for birth and parenting within the wise woman tradition. We will also explore birth as a metaphor in our lives.

Movement Activity Be moved by your prayers — literally! Exploration/discussion of how we each, as individuals use prayer in our lives. How we pray and if it works for us. What we do in our lives to create a sense of reverence. Discussion of the use of movement to help us carry out prayers — take them from an "inner space" to an "outer space" where others may witness. We will learn the movement tradition called "Earth Dance" done to a female version of the Lord's Prayer. The effect is similar to T'ai Chi, but with the added power of vocalized prayer.

Hiyalah Indiga is a member of a six-member dance troupe called "Body Prayers," which uses prayer as its inspiration for movement.

DANCES FOR UNIVERSAL PEACE (sacred circle dance) CSU 204 Movement Activity/Child Friendly

The dances provide a joyous, multicultural way to touch the spiritual essence within ourselves and others. Through the combined efforts of singing music and movement, participants are steeped in the life energy which opens the heart and leads to deeper meditative states. This is a "doing" workshop — no sitting down, except to rest, and no lecture.

Sister Johanna Seubert has a doctorate in music from Catholic University, Washington D.C., was chairperson of the music department at Viterbo College, LaCrosse, Wisconsin, and has taught music there for 8 years. She has extensive training and experience in liturgical music and the Dances of Universal Peace, and has had additional studies in scripture, religious formation, and spiritual direction. She resides at the Christine Center for Unitive Spirituality in Wisconsin.

Donna Ronning has been participating in the Dances for Universal Peace for two years. More recently, she has been honored by the opportunity to help facilitate some of the dances.

SPIRITUALITY AND SOCIAL JUSTICE: THE LIVES OF THREE MINNESOTA WOMEN OF AFRICAN-AMERICAN HERITAGE AND HISTORY

MH 206 Paper/Discussion/Presentation Three biographies of Minnesota women of history will be presented. The lives of Ethel Ray Nancy (1899-1992), Mattie Porter Jackson (1854-1946) and Nellie F. Griswold Francis (1874-1969) will be discussed for commonalities and differences in spiritual and social justice activities in diverse areas of Minnesota. The roles of black pioneers, church and clubwoman activities, suffrage and civil rights movements will be examined as they were lived by each woman. Frameworks for exploring African-American heritage in Minnesota will be offered to encourage further study.

Judy Yaeger Jones, historian of women who has researched and written extensively on Minnesota women and is currently presenting a program on African American Women and Suffrage during this 75th Anniversary of Women's Suffrage, 1920-1995.

Discussion/Experiential
Creativity, imagination and intuition are deeply connected aspects of our body/
psyche/souls, needed not only for individual growth and healing, but for our
communities, our villages and our world. In this creative writing workshop, the
presenters will draw on divination and oracular traditions - African, Caribbean,
Celtic, Aboriginal - to enhance your writing process and allow you to trust in your
own voice. A few traditions from the South Side of Chicago and the St. Paul
Summit U neighborhood will be thrown in for good measure. Come to write,
speak to your muse, be your own oracle, and tell good stories.

INTRODUCTION TO JOURNAL WRITING: A PROCESS OF REFLECTION, INNER CONNECTION, AND INSPIRATION (Part Two)

MH 209 Experiential When we connect to our present situation from within ourselves, we enter the inner movement of our whole life history. The present situation of our life comes into focus with a perspective that includes past experience and future potentials. Asking the question: "Where am I in the movement of my life?" opens us to our spiritual depths and creative resources. It connects us with the directive principle that is unfolding within us and helps us move into our future. Please bring notebooks for writing exercises. (See Session I for Bio)

NEW FACES IN ASTROLOGY

AH 211 Paper/Discussion For centuries astrology has disclosed its wisdom primarily through planets of masculine energy, with the exception of Venus and the Moon. Now, astrology reveals fresh dynamics through the study of four asteroid bodies, called Asteroid Goddesses. Important ways to see the emergence of feminist influences once hidden.

LIFE AND TRIBULATIONS OF AN AFRICAN-AMERICAN WOMAN

AH 225 Paper/Discussion WE will talk about life and complications for an African-American woman. We will focus on life and tribulations, to accept life on life's terms and to know there is a resolution, if not a solution to any problem we face. Poetry will shed light on drug addiction, sobriety and the African-American in a White society.




