The Women and Spirituality Conference was born sixteen years ago with an evening lecture attended by 75 people. Since then the conference has grown to average approximately 800 participants with 80-120 workshops. The Conference does not advocate or exclude any view and continues to foster an understanding and celebration of similarities and differences. 1998 Keynote Speaker

The Seventeenth Annual Women and Spirituality Conference will be held at Mankato State University on Saturday & Sunday, October 10 and 11, 1998. Our keynote speaker is Sister Paula Gonzàlez, S.C

Sister Paula, of Cincinnati, is founder of EarthConnection, a center of "living lightly" on the Earth. Having offered over 1,000 consciousness-raising programs on ecological spirituality, she continues to utilize faith and spiritu-

Reflections on the health of the Earth, our connection to it and our responsibility to care for it will be major themes of the keynote address. Together, we will explore new modes of agriculture that honor the Earth and other living creatures. Through dialogue about the necessity to radically change how we live, think, and respond to the web of life, we will challenge ourselves in new ways. Activists, educators, students, farmers, leaders of faith communities, members of religious communities, and all who are dedicated to ensuring that future people will have soil, water and food should attend.

Bring your lunch and your daughters to a workshop on ecological alternatives to bleached tampons which can be expensive and harmful to your body and the environment. Natural sponges are easy to use and will provide you a feeling of pride as you take responsibility for your health, your cycle and your Earth. Unlike commercially-made tampons, sponges are not stiff, uncomfortable objects you force to fit your body. Rather, they work with your body as you discover the economic, health and environmental benefits of natural resources.

Given the compact time-frame, this will not be a hands-on workshop. However, you will gain practical knowledge, information, and handouts that you will be able to take back to your homes and communities.

THE CELTIC COSMOLOGY: MOTHER EARTH'S CHALLENGE FOR PERSONAL GROWTH

AH 220

Together we build a stone circle. Within the safety of its sacred space, through storytelling, poetry, guided meditation and thought provoking questions, we go "betwixt and between." ("Betwixt and between" is a very old Irish concept that represents the space between time and space where we can slip away from ordinary reality and see a cosmic picture.) As we study the symbology of the Celtic cross and understand how the Celts personified the land and related to it, we learn techniques to help us connect with the voice of the earth, hear its truths and incorporate them into our lives.

WOMEN SHAMANS: PART I

MASTERING THE CHRIST CONSCIOUSNESS GRID

MH 209 Lecture/Discussion Women have an essential role to play in planetary ascension, the evolution of higher consciousness on Earth. 


